To create a thesis statement come up with a <u>Question</u> and identify possible perspectives, perceptions, solutions From this choose a position, take a stand, and list evidence or proof to support

A thesis statement tells the reader how you will interpret the significance of the subject.

A thesis is not <u>confrontational</u> ; it is <u>narrow</u>
rather than 1, 00 1
fact and is not a
or observation.

A good thesis has three parts:

Part 1 states topic Part 2 states position Part 3 states area of in vestigation

Does the thesis answer the question

How to tell a strong thesis statement from a weak one.

1. Takes a stand 2. Justifies discussion 3. <u>expresses</u> one main idea 4. is specific
